Ethnocentrism


- view everything from the perspective of your own cultural beliefs and values
- prejudicial view
 - · common during colonialism

Moral Objectivism

- belief in some universal or objective moral principles
 - for all people
 - in all social environments
- to be covered in next lecture



Ethical Relativism

- moral principles are created by humans
 - principles are dependent upon the perspective of the creators
- Two branches
 - Subjective ethical relativism
 - Conventional ethical relativism

Subjectivism (Subjective Ethical Relativism)

- moral rules established by the individual
 - not based on one's culture
 - not based on an objective value
- Problem:
 - Hitler would be as moral as Ghandi as long as both acted according to their principles.



Conventionalism (Conventional Ethical Relativism)

- Moral principles justified by their cultural acceptance.
 - social nature of principles
 - still no universal principles

Conventionalism: Diversity Thesis

- Cultural Relativism
 - moral rules differ from society to society



Conventionalism: Dependency Thesis

 individual acts are judged in the context of the culture in which they occur.



Ethical Relativism is dependent upon intercultural tolerance

- If morality is based on culture,
 - then you can only criticize the morality of your own culture
- If we cannot criticize other cultures,
 - then we must be tolerant to the morality of other cultures

Ethical Relativism is dependent upon intercultural tolerance (Cont)

- If morality is based on culture
 - then we must be tolerant of the moralities of other cultures
- but what if the morality of the culture is one of intolerance...



Civil Disobediance

- Moral reformers challenge the acceptance of current cultural standards
- according to conventional ethical relativism,
 - their actions are wrong...
